Historian's Column

We are pleased to announce that Volume VI of the 7th Edition of *American Boyers* will be ready to go to press later this year. This will keep us on a schedule of issuing the remaining volumes of the 7th Edition at two year intervals.

Volume VI will begin with Chapter 125 [EU], and will extend to approximately Chapter 220 [IL], or as many of the remaining chapters that will fit into approximately 1100 pages, similar to Volumes IV and V.

The deadline for information for Volume VI is Saturday, July 27, 2002, the date of our annual reunion at Boyertown, Pa. The historian and assistants will gladly accept information at the reunion, or you may mail the information to your historian at 990 E. Philadelphia St., York, PA 17403-1121. If you submitted information several years ago, we urge you to submit data on events that have occurred since then, so that Volume VI will be up to date. If births or deaths occur after July 27, you may submit the information to the historian who will insert it if feasible before publication.

How should your information be submitted? Printouts from your computer program are acceptable, and even preferred. However, vital facts that sometimes are missing from submissions are month and day of birth, place of birth, death, and burial, birth dates of spouses, city or place of current residence, and occupations. If you are not using a computer, forms for reporting information are available from the historian. All information submitted is appreciated and will be incorporated into its appropriate chapter for later publication.

Unlike other publications by commercial ventures, for which you may have received a solicitation from time to time, *American Boyers* traces family lines from the earliest known ancestor to the most recent additions, and enables you to determine relationships between individuals.

An order form for Volumes 1, 2, 3, 4, and 5 of the Seventh Edition is included with this newsletter.

A Volume VII will be needed to complete the publication of the remaining chapters containing information for the Seventh Edition. Following Volume VII will be the publication of the final volumes of the Seventh Edition containing a number of appendices, an index of the Boyer-Byers, etc. names, and a name index for all other persons mentioned in the Seventh Edition.

An annual Memorial List containing over 500 names with identification numbers is compiled by the historian each July before our annual reunion. Information for the memorial list is obtained from newspaper obituaries in Indianapolis, Ind., Baltimore, Frederick, Hagerstown, and Westminster, Md., Mullen, and North Platte, Neb., Dayton,

Reunion Directions

Boyertown is located almost midway between Reading and Philadelphia Pennsylvania, just 6 miles north of Pottstown. It is located on State Route 73 just 0.4 miles west of State Route 100. From the North:

Take Route 100 south to Route 73. Take Route 73 west about 0.4 miles to Madison Ave. Take a left on Madison and go for about 0.4 miles. The Boyertown Community park will be on the right.

From the South:

Take Route 100 north to Route 73. Take Route 73 west about 0.4 miles to Madison Ave. Take a left on Madison and go for about 0.4 miles. The Boyertown Community park will be on the right.

From East & West:

You need to get to Route 100. There are a number of East/West highways that hook up with Route 100. They include I-76 and I-78. After getting to Route 100 use the directions for North and South.

Boyer preformed in 352 air shows in the United States and Canada. She specialized in wingwalking, while also accomplishing 37 parachute jumps and 143 automobile-to-plane transfers.

Gathered again at the 97th Reunion

The 97th Annual Boyer reunion was again held in Boyertown, PA last year. The weather was beautiful and comfortable. It was a wonderful day for friends and relations to gather together. Approximately 110 were in attendance from all over the United States. Some of the states included: Missouri, Georgia, Michigan, Colorado, California, Virginia, Ohio, New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and Maryland.

Bill Boyer (IE218) was in charge of the informal genealogical roundtable. He told about the Ellis Island web site and other good ones to find genealogical information. Joyce Marot (BA) told about her grandparents living near Gettysburg at the time of the Battle of Gettysburg. Susan Boyer talked about the Union Cemetery at Schuylkill Haven and searching for ancestors there. John Boyer offered some Boyer information from the Civil War days. Lloyd Yost mentioned some of the web sites that he had explored. The session was well received and enjoyed by all.

Rev. Lloyd Yost offered prayer before the noon meal. The catering for those that purchased a lunch was done by Boyer Catering of Boyertown. The meal was excellent and when asked how everyone liked it, the response was a resounding applause and agreement to have them back again this year.

After food and fellowship time, the program was begun with **Bill Boyer**, president of the Association, presiding. Bill started with a brief discussion of the 100th reunion coming in a few years and requested any ideas for it. The annual sing-a-long of the Boyer songs was led by **Harriet Boyer Harman** and **Patricia Boyer Lewis**. After the songs Bill asked for hands of first timers to the reunion of which there were many.

Donald Boyer, Association Historian, provided the attendees with an update on the publishing of the books. He stated he was working on Volume 6, hoping to have it ready in two years. He mentioned information about a number of publications and articles he had seen over the past year, including information about the Boyer quartet who performed at the 1911 reunion in Tamaqua. Much data continues to come in and he plans to add it to the index.

Bill thanked the many volunteers for their help for the day and a hearty round of applause was given to them. He also mentioned that Paul Boyer and his wife from Lima, OH could not attend and were missed as they helped out for many years at the registration table. **Hilda Yeager** announced that she would be stepping down as secretary after many years of service. She would still offer her assistance to the Association as a Director.

Allen Boyer Russell presided over the election of officers. All the incumbents were nominated without opposition, and were unanimously elected. Bill Boyer then asked for a volunteer for secretary and **Janice Peresolak** was nominated and elected with much appreciation from Hilda.

Dana Blomquist related how he had gotten into researching Boyers who served in the wars. He is compiling a document with as much information as he can find and will hopefully be able to share it with the Association when completed.

Rick Boyer, Vice President of the Association, took over as master of ceremonies for awarding of prizes. The prizes went to the following: Oldest man: **Kenneth Boyer**, Selinsgrove, PA, 91 years; Oldest woman: **Pauline Boyer**, York, PA, 82 years; Farthest distance: **Lester Boyer**, California; Youngest child: **Brittany Boyer**, California, 12 years; Married longest: **Robert and Eleanor Boyer**, Wyomissing, PA, 62 years.

Bill closed the program by wishing everyone a safe trip home and to come back again next year.

Kenneth Boyer

It is our sad duty to inform you of the passing of **Kenneth Boyer** (AD13C5222) of Selinsgrove, PA. Kenneth had been a big part of the Association for over 40 years. He had been president, vice-president, a director, and treasurer. Many of you may remember him over the past few years taking the prize for oldest man present, with this past year Ken being 91 years young. We remember him over most of the past 20 years as the treasurer of the Association. Ken would always be meticulous with the books and made sure everyone knew what was going on with the Association's finances. He was also instrumental in allowing the Association to have reunions at Salem's Grove Church for a number of years in the 1980s. Also Ken always had a big smile to share with anyone who he would come in contact with. He was excited about the Association and what it did and made sure to let others know. You always knew you could depend on Ken to be there and help out. Our reunions will be a little dimmer in the future without his bright personality. We will miss you Ken.

It has also come to our attention that Frances Benfer passed away. Many who had been to the reunions in the 1960s, 70s, and 80s will remember Frances as the "prize lady." She always made sure there were prizes available. Many times she made them, but she always brought smiles to those who were lucky to win one.



Boyer Family Stories



A Sampler from Volume VI and future volumes

The items below are taken from entries in the forthcoming Volume VI of the 7th Edition of our history and some from future volumes, American Boyers. References are to chapter and family member.

GEORGE HILLMAN BOWYER, (EW1) b. 1835, in Chatford, County of Gloucestershire, England, d. Aug. 12, 1897, Birmingham, England. He came to Birmingham to be an apprentice in toolmaking. He received a letter from his father "asking him to be a good servant to his master."

JOSEPH HENRY BOYER, (EZ237) b. Feb. 29, 1884, Coalville, Summit Co., Utah, d. Mar. 11, 1967. Farmer. He was very active in helping to build prominent buildings in Upton, Utah, and doing such things as putting in the telephone and electric lights in the community. He was active in community affairs and at the time of his death was the oldest sheepman in Summit County.

JOSEPH CLINTON BOYER, (FB1) b. Sept. 12, 1820, Randolph Co., Ill., near the Gasconada River, d. Apr. 17, 1904, Leon, Iowa. Mrs. Remple (5- FB1511) noted that he served in the Civil War; that he was with Sherman on the "March to the Sea," was Chaplain and a quartermaster.

WILLIAM BOYER, (FD212) b. about 1846, d. Mar. 14, 1908. At the age of sixteen he joined the Northern Army as a drummer boy under an assumed name and went from there into the cavalry. He was there until about the end of the War, for he spent the last five months in Belle Isle Prison. After release he went home and his own mother did not know him. He lost all his army papers in a fire in Eureka City, Nevada, so his son never knew the names he enlisted under; so reported Benjamin F. Boyer (5-FD2125), July 22, 1934. He served in the 15th Ohio Cavalry.

WILLIAM BYARS, (FK11D) b. Nov. 18, 1776, d. Feb. 12, 1865. Founder of Emory & Henry College. Member of House of Delegates from Washington Co., Va., 1809-12. Major and later a Colonel in War of 1812.

OZIAS DENTON "DENT" BYARS, (FK15838) b. Apr. 5, 1848, Tenn., d. about 1896, Tenn. He was killed by a ricochet bullet one Sunday morning as he was passing a farm house near Salem Church. The farm family was out in the yard killing a chicken for Sunday dinner when the accident occurred.

PETER L. BYERS (FNA) was born Dec. 15, 1845, Armstrong Co., Pa., d. Aug., 1918, Huntington Park, Calif. Mrs. Paul B. Miller (4- FNA91) reported that he was one of thirteen children and "left home to make his own way in the world when only nine years old." His parents were Amish, she noted. He served in the Civil War with a Northern Cavalry unit.

CHARLES FREDERICK WILBUR BOYER, (GC15) b. Apr. 2, 1875, Charlotte, Monroe Co., N.Y., d. Apr. 10, 1953; buried at Sylvan Abbey Cem., Clearwater, Fla. Charles was a very versatile person in his early years. He was a mason, carpenter, painter, had his own interior decorating business, cobbler, barber, bicycle racer, boxer, wrestler, made a living for a time shooting ducks and selling feathers, and was once a deputy sheriff. In later years he took extension work from Cornell University (having previously never gone beyond the fourth grade) and became a very successful fruit farmer. Scottsville, N.Y. In World War I he took additional training and became a tool and die maker in war industry. He came out of retirement in World War II, again as a tool and die maker. Following the war he again retired, moving to Clearwater, Fla.

LEWIS BOYER (GQ4) was born 1755/56, near Hagerstown, Md., and died Saturday, Sept. 23, 1843, Springcreek Twp., Miami Co., Ohio; buried in Old Wesley Chapel Cemetery, Orange Twp., Shelby Co., Ohio, where his gravestone shows he died Sept. 19, 1843. He served in the Revolutionary War as a life-guard to General Washington. He was promoted to Lieutenant, 2nd Battalion, 58th Regiment of Virginia, on Mar. 27, 1781, by Governor Henry Lee. His original discharge papers, which presented him with the horse, arms and accounterments in his possession as a gratuity, were signed by George Washington at Philadelphia on Dec. 10, 1783.

WILLIAM BOYER (HE) left Schuylkill County, Pennsylvania, for the gold rush before the birth of his son and was never heard from again, according to his great-grandchildren.

JOHN WILLIAM BOYER (HV) was born Oct. 18, 1848, in either Snyder Co., Pa., Carpenter. He first saw his bride-to-be as she whirled around in a square dance. Never having set foot upon a dance floor himself, he asked a fellow standing next to him if he knew who the pretty little girl with the dimpled cheeks and long brown curls was. After being answered with a positive, he then asked if the fellow would do the honor of introducing them. Thus began their courtship.

CHARLES BOYER (III) was born Aug. 28, 1899, in Figeac, southern France, and died Aug. 26, 1978, at Paradise Valley, a luxurious desert suburb northeast of Phoenix, Ariz. In his early twenties he became a leading actor of the French stage. Brought to Hollywood to star in French versions of English language films, he eventually mastered the English language and began a career in Hollywood that spiraled upward, encompassing over 75 films. He earned a degree in philosophy from the Sorbonne in Paris. He became an American citizen in 1942.


