Volume VI at the Publisher

Through the continued effort of Donald Boyer, our historian, the Association is pleased to announce the publication of volume 6 only two years after volume 5. This volume brings us closer to the end of the publishing of Boyer lines for the 7th Edition. It is anticipated that one more volume will complete all information that has been submitted or researched. Then one or two volumes will follow for appendices and a complete index. Detailed information about this volume including a copy of the book's table of contents (minus the page numbers) and the order form for all of the books can be found in this newsletter.

For a limited time we are offering volume 6 at a pre-publication price of \$45. This price is only good up to and at the reunion date of July 26, 2003. For any orders postmarked later than July 26, 2003 the price will increase to \$50, the same as the earlier volumes in the set. Currently the scheduled delivery of volume 6 is the week before the reunion. After the Association's shipper receives volume 6 it will be 6 to 8 weeks for delivery to you. We expect to have all of the volumes available for sale at the reunion. Please note the address for ordering of all volumes; we have been contracting the book orders to a division of Boyer Printing of Lebanon, PA for a couple of years now. DO NOT send any other correspondence to the address for ordering books. Any questions, comments, additional donations, or payments for such things as membership or catered lunches must go to the addresses specified on their related forms. Failure to follow these directions may cause very large delays in processing of your request.

Finally if you are planning to come to the reunion and would like to purchase the Boyer books there then please use the form found on page 11. This is similar to a will-call for tickets. No sending of money is required. We just want to know how many books may be needed at the reunion to guarantee enough are brought that day without having to haul the whole warehouse. Make sure to get that form in as soon as possible so we can have the correct counts ready.

99th Reunion at Boyertown

The Association of American Boyers Inc., 99th Annual Reunion is set for Saturday July 26, 2003 at the Boyertown Community Park in Boyertown, Pennsylvania. 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Historian's Column

As this column is being written in late March, the first proofreading of the approximate 1,124 pages for Volume 6 of the Seventh Edition of *American Boyers* has taken place. The text for Volume 6 was completed by your historian on Dec. 31, 2002. Our president, Bill Boyer, has been busy converting the text from the historian's computer program into Pagemaker format so that it will be similar to the previous editions of American Boyers. Due to the volume of information received last year, Chapters 214 (IF) through 220 (IL) did not make it

into Volume 6, but will be included in Volume 7, which we hope to have available in about two years. Also, the chapter containing the descendants of John Beyer of Windsor Twp., York Co., Pa., which had been shown as Chapter 177 (GU), has been changed to Chapter 229 (IU), which will be included in Volume 7. This change was necessary because the chapter has expanded to about 350 pages and would not fit into Volume 6. The order form for Pre-publication orders for Volume 6 is included with this newsletter. We urge you to order Volume 6 at the reduced pre-publication price. Our goal is to have Volume 6 ready for distribution by our reunion date of July 26.

Work is progressing on the remaining chapters for the Seventh Edition. Volume 7 will begin with Chapter 214 [IF], and will include the remaining chapters that have not yet been published in the seventh edition. Hopefully, they will fit in the approximately 1100 page limit for each volume. We urge you to submit updated information now if your line has not been published in the first six volumes of the Seventh Edition. The anticipated deadline for Volume 7 information will be July 24, 2004. The final volumes of the Seventh Edition will contain an index of the Boyer-Byers, etc. names, and a name index for all other persons mentioned in the Seventh Edition.

We encourage everyone to continue to report new information and findings, and thank you for the information that has been received. Information may be mailed to your historian at 990 E. Philadelphia St., York, PA 17403-1121. You may also bring information to the reunion where the historian and assistants will be glad to receive your data.

How should your information be submitted? Printouts from your computer program are acceptable, and even preferred. However, vital facts that sometimes are missing from submissions are month and day of birth, place of birth, death, and burial, birth dates of spouses, city or place of current residence, and occupations. If you are not using a computer, forms for reporting information are available from the historian. All information submitted is appreciated and will be incorporated into its appropriate chapter for later publication.



From the South:

Take Route 100 north to Route 73. Take Route 73 west about 0.4 miles to Madison Ave. Take a left on Madison and go for about 0.4 miles. The Boyertown Community park will be on the right.

From East & West:

You need to get to Route 100. There are a number of East/West highways that hook up with Route 100. They include I-76 and I-78. After getting to Route 100 use the directions for North and South.

Boyer Family Stories



A Sampler from Volume VI and future volumes

The items below are taken from entries in the forthcoming volumes of the 7th Edition of our history, American Boyers. References are to chapter and family member.

JOSEPH HENRY BOYER, (EZ237) b. Feb. 29, 1884, Coalville, Summit Co., Utah, d. Mar. 11, 1967. Farmer. He was very active in helping to build prominent buildings in Upton, Utah, and doing such things as putting in the telephone and electric lights in the community. He was active in community affairs and at the time of his death was the oldest sheepman in Summit County.

WILLIAM BYARS, (FK11D) b. Nov. 18, 1776, d. Feb. 12, 1865. Founder of Emory & Henry College. Member of House of Delegates from Washington Co., Va., 1809-12. Major and later a Colonel in War of 1812.

LEWIS BOYER (GQ4) was born 1755/56, near Hagerstown, Md., and died Saturday, Sept. 23, 1843, Springcreek Twp., Miami Co., Ohio; buried in Old Wesley Chapel Cemetery, Orange Twp., Shelby Co., Ohio, where his gravestone shows he died Sept. 19, 1843. He served in the Revolutionary War as a life-guard to General Washington. He was promoted to Lieutenant, 2nd Battalion, 58th Regiment of Virginia, on Mar. 27, 1781, by Governor Henry Lee. His original discharge papers, which presented him with the horse, arms and accounterments in his possession as a gratuity, were signed by George Washington at Philadelphia on Dec. 10, 1783.

HUGH le BOWIER (HF) was born about 1303-1343. He lived at Newcastle-under-Lyme, Co. Stafford, England, where he received a grant of protection in 1365. A Bowyer Pedigree chart prepared by the College of Arms, London, is in the possession of the Maryland Genealogical Society, Baltimore, having been presented to them in 1934 by Hon. John Philip Hill. Many Bowyer descendants are listed on this chart; since most of them remained in England, they are not enumerated in this chapter. A son was Thomas.

CHARLES BOYER (II1) was born Aug. 28, 1899, in Figeac, southern France, and died Aug. 26, 1978, at Paradise Valley, a luxurious desert suburb northeast of Phoenix, Ariz. In his early twenties he became a leading actor of the French stage. Brought to Hollywood to star in French versions of English language films, he eventually mastered the English language and began a career in Hollywood that spiraled upward, encompassing over 75 films. He earned a degree in philosophy from the Sorbonne in Paris. He became an American citizen in 1942.

JOHN BOYER (IM2) b. 1812, Sumner Co., Tenn., d. Sept. 7, 1857, during the Mountain Meadow Massacre in Utah. John was one of the many people who lost their lives while on the way to California during the Gold Rush, as there was a John Boyer listed as a member of a wagon train that left Fort Smith, Ark., in the 1850's. He married Nancy Paskell, b. 1812, Tenn. They were listed in the 1840 census of Pope Co., Ark. They were listed in the 1850 census of Johnson Co., Ark., along with their children and James Edward, possibly her uncle. The 1860 census of Sabastian Co., Ark., listed Nancy and the children, but not John. In the probating of the estate of John's father, Henry Boyer (1- IM), in 1861, in Johnson Co., Ark., "the heirs of John Boyer living in Sabastian Co., Ark." were mentioned, indicating that John was dead. Children: Sarah J., Lavania, Nancy, and William H.

---- BOYER (IP) was the father of two sons, William, and Caleb. These boys, when aged 9 and 7, were placed as stow-a-ways on a ship leaving France. This was during a French uprising and because the lives of these boys were in danger, the parents were forced to hide them on a ship headed for New York to get them away from the trouble. They never saw them again.

CLARENCE LEONARD BOYER (IU13123), b. Jan. 1, 1894, at Rummel's Mill near Butler, Richland Co., Ohio, d. Aug. 1, 1972, at Staunton, Va., where he is buried in Thornrose Cemetery. Colonel, U.S. Army. Graduated from Ohio State Univ. in 1920 with the degree of Civil Engineer. He served with the 4th Ohio Infantry on the Mexican border, 1915-16, and with the 44th U.S. Infantry, 13th Division during World War I. Asst. Div. Eng., N.Y. Central R.R., 1920-26. Structural engineer, Office of Supervising Architect, Washington, D.C. Member of War Dept. General Staff, 1937-38. Entered Morocco with 15th Army, World War II; U.S. representative for Southern Morocco, making official visits to Taureg tribes in Sahara Desert and Arab kingdoms. Entered Italy with the invasion forces, and acted as engineer reconnaissance officer until Rome was taken, when he was flown to London and joined the invasion forces into France at Cherbourg. He was reconnaissance engineer with the armies through France, Belgium, Holland and Germany, and was in the first detachment to reach Berlin. After capture of Berlin, he commanded and organized the railway service. Resided at Staunton, Va., after retirement. Married (1) Aug. 19, 1918, Florence Lucille Yarnell. She resided at Takoma Park, Md., in 1973. Children: Rodney L., Jean M., and Patricia A. Married (2) 1947, Berlin, Germany, the Countess Eugenie von Liedert, who died Aug. 27, 1972. She resided at Staunton, Va. Violin virtuoso and orchestra leader, dau. of Count Robert von Liedert, St. Petersburg, Russia. No children.

JOHN BYER (JE1) was born Jan. 31, 1777, Lancaster Co., Pa., died Feb. 12, 1859, Washington Co., Md. He is recorded on page 274 of the *History of Leitersburg District, Washington Co., Md.* He came to Washington Co., Md., about 1800. He engaged in milling and distilling near Leitersburg, and also operated a tannery and other industries. Captain in the local militia. Later he moved to Hagerstown, Md., where he owned the Antietam House, a hotel. His will was made Jan. 15, 1859, and was probated Feb. 15, 1859. He married (1) 1803, Catharine Study, who died after two children were born. Children: Frederick, and Anna Margaret. He married (2) Aug. 24, 1809, Washington Co., Md., Elizabeth Lantz, b. June 18, 1789, d. Jan. 27, 1841; buried at St. Paul's Evan. Lutheran Church Cemetery, Leitersburg, Washington Co., Md., where John is also buried. No children.

JOHN BOYER (JJ12), b. Apr. 15, 1828, Claiborne Co., Tenn., d. May 31, 1913, McDonald Co., Mo., of blood poisoning after getting a thorn in his foot. In 1849 he went to California in the Gold Rush; later returned to Missouri. Farmer. When the Civil War broke out, John volunteered, but his people were still in Tennessee and he didn't want to fight against them, so he went to Little Rock, Ark., to join. While he was in the war he was a blacksmith and shod mules. Married (1) 1852, Elizabeth Angeline Wheeler, b. Apr. 17, 1824, Tiff City, Mo., d. July 10, 1885. Both buried in Price Cem., May, McDonald Co., Mo. Children: Infant Son, Sarah F., John H., and James D. Married (2) May Mayberry. Divorced at Pineville, Mo. Child: Esther E. Married (3) -----, who was much younger than he was. They were not married very long when he paid her approximately \$700.00 to leave, which she did.

JOHN BOYER (JS1), b. 1788 in Pa. He lived in Newstead, Erie Co., N.Y., before 1812. He was a Captain in the Army during the War of 1812. According to family information, he raised and outfitted his own company. He was stationed for several months in Lewiston, Maine. A letter which he wrote to his wife while there is in the possession of L. W. McCord (5- JS1314). Farmer. Supervisor in 1846 and 1847. Married Olive -----, b. 1794 in Conn. Both are reported to be buried at Newstead, Erie Co., N.Y. Children: Jacob, Roxanna, and Harriet E.

JAMES VALENTINE BORER (JT5211), b. June 5, 1847, Union Twp., Perry Co., Ind., d. Mar. 31, 1929. Farmer. Operated the ferry that his father owned. Also operated with his father a flat boat which ran to New Orleans. Married, Apr. 29, 1874, Anna Liza Suddarth, b. Feb. 9, 1852, d. Sept. 9, 1890. Both buried in Stephenson Cem., near Dexter, Ind. Children: Pernia A., Mattie J., Sidney A., Oliver C., and Joseph C.

LAWSON BOYER (JY) died Nov. 30, 1863, of wounds received in action near Rappahannock Station, Va., during the Civil War. He resided in Frederick Co., Md., and enlisted Aug. 13, 1862. He served as a Private in the Seventh Regiment Infantry, Company G, Maryland Volunteers. His parents have not been reported. He married, license issued Mar. 27, 1856, at Frederick, Md., Phebe A. Crouse, who was born about Jan., 1838. She married (2) Oct. 17, 1867, Lewis M. Smith. Only child of Lawson Boyer: Emma H.

JONATHAN BOYER (KC15), b. Aug. 7, 1845, baptism recorded by Stoystown Lutheran Church, Somerset Co., Pa., d. 1924. Served as a Private with Pa. Vol., Civil War, spending 15 months and 27 days in the Andersonville prison. Farmer. Married (1) Anna Mariah Sell, b. 1838, Hooversville, Pa., d. 1918. Both buried at Hooversville Ref. Cem., Shade Twp., Somerset Co., Pa. Children: John P., Mitas G., Peter M., Amaniah, Walter J., Lenora, and Charles G. Married (2) Anna Tressler.

HOWARD "LOBBY" BAIER (LD4), b. June 8, 1890, Lebanon, Pa., d. Oct. 7, 1989, Lebanon, Pa., aged 99 years. Served in France with 316th Machine Gun Battalion during World War I. He retired as Vice-President, former George Krause Hardware Store, Lebanon, Pa., after 52 years employment. Avid hunter and fisherman. Lutheran. Married Mary E. Hetrick, who died 1969. Both buried at Mt. Lebanon Cem., Lebanon, Pa.

JEROME G. BYERS (LH) was born 1819-22, probably in Washington Co., Pa., died Oct. 2, 1864, Andersonville prison in Georgia. He was a carpenter, 5 ft. 9 in. tall, with blue eyes, dark hair, and a medium complexion. He enlisted in the Civil War on Feb. 25, 1864, with the Ringgold Cavalry, 22nd Pa. Vol. Cavalry, Co. E. He was captured by the enemy at Lost River Gap, Va., May 10, 1864. Married, Nov. 24, 1842, Jane Johnston, b. 1820, d. June 7, 1892; buried at Mt. Zion Church Cem., Nottingham Twp., Washington Co., Pa. Children: David J., Sarah J., Mary, George D., Margaret, Nancy, Isabel, William E., John H., and Jerome D.

NANCY BEYER (LP4) died Sept. 5, 1994, at St. Luke's Medical Center, Milwaukee, Wis.; buried in Holy Sepulcher Cemetery. She served in the Women's Army Corps from 1943 to 1945. Her unit was part of the Normandy Invasion in 1944. She is credited by the British Broadcasting Co. with being the first WAC to land in Normandy during the invasion. Married Eugene R. Olszewski, who died Dec. 29, 1966. South Milwaukee, Wis. Children: Mary, Margaret, Charles, Anne, Madeline, Thomas, Patricia, and Michael.

This column, appearing in each of our newsletters, provides interesting items on recent events in the lives of Boyer family members. Contributions for future issues are welcome. Family ID numbers, where known, are from our genealogy.

Boyer's Food Markets, founded in 1949 in Orwigsburg, Pa., by the late **Harold S. Boyer** (AW953), has expanded to 16 stores in eastern Pennsylvania by adding a store in Shoemakersville, Pa.

The Bob and Elizabeth Boyer Scholarship Fund was created by **J. Robert Boyer** (U3238) and **B. Elizabeth Boyer** for deserving students in Frederick and Washington counties, Maryland. Bob is the retired owner of the Bob Boyer Insurance Agency, Boonsboro, Md.
