It is handicap accessible, with air conditioning, and nice rest room facilities. Plenty of parking is available.

Historian's Column

We are pleased to announce that Volume VII of the 7th Edition of American Boyers will be ready to go to press later this year. This will continue our schedule of issuing the remaining volumes of the 7th edition at two year intervals.

Volume VII will begin with Chapter 214 [IF], and will extend to approximately Chapter 551 [VE], or as many of the remaining chapters

that will fit into approximately 1100 pages, similar to Volumes IV, V, and VI.

The deadline for information for Volume VII is Saturday, July 31, 2004, a week after our 100th annual reunion. The historian and assistants will gladly accept information at the reunion, or you may mail the information to your historian at 990 E. Philadelphia St., York, PA 17403-1121. If you submitted information several years ago, we urge you to submit data on events that have occurred since then, so that Volume VII will be up to date. If births or deaths occur after July 31, you may submit the information to the historian who will insert it if feasible before publication.

Approximately 340 chapters are expected to be included in Volume VII. Due to space limitations, many of the new smaller chapters have not been listed here.

Following the publication of Volume VII will be the publication of the final volumes of the Seventh Edition, which will include an index of the Boyer-Byers, etc. names, a name index for all other persons mentioned in the Seventh Edition, and other miscellaneous information.

We encourage everyone to continue to report new information and findings, and thank you for the information that has been received. Information may be mailed to your historian at 990 E. Philadelphia St., York, PA 17403-1121. You may also bring information to the reunion where the historian and assistants will be glad to receive your data.

How should your information be submitted? Printouts from your computer program are acceptable, and even preferred. However, vital facts that sometimes are missing from Rev. Lloyd H. & Ellen Yost BX11C submissions are month and day of birth, place of birth, death, and burial, birth dates of spouses, city or place of current residence, and occupations. If you are not using a computer, forms for reporting information are available from the historian. All information submitted is appreciated and will be incorporated into its appropriate chapter for later publication.

An annual Memorial List containing over 500 names with identification numbers is compiled by the historian each July before our annual reunion. Information for the memorial list is obtained from newspaper obituaries in Indianapolis, Ind., Baltimore, Frederick, Hagerstown, and Westminster, Md., Mullen, and North Platte, Neb., Dayton, and Toledo, Ohio, Allentown, Butler, Carlisle, Chambersburg, Hanover, Harrisburg, Indiana, Johnstown, Lancaster, Lebanon, Norristown, Philadelphia, Pottstown, Pottsville, Reading, Shamokin, Somerset, Sunbury, and York, Pa., and Galax, Va., as well as data sent to us from correspondents. Please send a self-addressed stamped envelope to Bill Boyer, 3435 Livingston Dr., Jefferson MD 21755, and we will send you a copy when the listing for the past 12 months is completed in July.

Recipients of this newsletter are urged to clip items concerning Boyer-Byers, etc., from newspapers, include the date and name of the newspaper, and send them to the historian. We thank those who have sent information and trust that you will continue to send additional news.



FROM THE EAST - Take I-76 West (PA Turnpike) get off at Exit 247 (Harrisburg East). Take center lane to I-83 North toward Hazleton/ Lewistown. Follow signs to I-81. Take I-81 South toward Carlisle. Take Exit 65 (Enola) onto Routes 11/15 South (Enola). From Routes 11/15 travel one half mile and turn right at the traffic light onto Valley Road. Travel a half mile or so over the hill. Central Penn is on the left.

OR

Take I-78 West. This road will merge with I-81 South. Stay on I-81 South and take Exit 65 (Enola). Travel about one half mile and turn right at the traffic light onto Valley Road. Travel a half mile or so over the hill. Central Penn is on the left.

FROM THE WEST - Take I-76 East (PA Turnpike) to Exit 226 (Carlisle). Go north on I-81 to Exit 65 (Enola) onto Routes 11/15 South. Go one half mile and turn right at the traffic light onto Valley Road. Travel a half mile or so over the hill. Central Penn is on the left.

Boyer Family Stories



A Sampler from Volume VII

The items below are taken from entries in the forthcoming volume VII of the 7th Edition of our history, American Boyers. References are to chapter and family member.

JOHN BOYER, (IU85), b. Aug. 9, 1791, baptism recorded by Evan. Lutheran Church, Berlin, Somerset Co., Pa., d. Nov. 5, 1856; buried in the farm graveyard on the old homestead in Stony Creek Twp., Somerset Co., Pa. Blacksmith and farmer. Lutheran. Liberal education in English and German.

LUCIUS LEONIDAS "SHOBE" BOYER, (IG18), b. Jan. 1, 1845, Devereux, Ga., d. May 27, 1917, Hancock Co., Ga. Served in Co. C, 27th Battalion, Ga. Inf., Civil War.

OTTO BAIER, (LV), was born probably between 1867-1887, and apparently resided at Klokocevac, Yugoslavia, as a daughter was born there in 1907. He married Manda Pavosevic. Children: Maria, and Edwin.

FREDERICK BOYER, (LY), resided in Robeson Twp., Berks Co., Pa., at the time of the 1800 census. His presence in Robeson Twp. suggests a possible relationship to Philip Boyer (1- JW). The absence of any type of death record for this family would indicate that they migrated westward. Married Catharine -----. Children, so far as known from baptismal records: Salome, Mary, Catharine, and David.

SOPHIA SUSANNA BOYER, (MG1), was born Aug. 26, 1812, in or near London, England, d. May 29, 1900, Bailey's Station, near Providence, Lucas Co., Ohio. She migrated with her parents from London, England, around 1825 when she was about 13 years old. While waiting for passage to America, she and her friend went to the stock yards in London where they opened the gate and let the cattle out on the streets of London. She said she had to stay hidden until they sailed.

RICHARD BOYER, (MK), was born about 1628-48. He arrived in Maryland in 1667, as known from **The Early Settlers of Maryland**. Elizabeth Boyer is also shown as arriving in 1667. In June, 1671, he purchased Plum Park, S. Sassafras River, Cecil Co., Md., a Testamentary Proceeding recorded in 1686 in Cecil Co., Md., refers to Richard Boyer and Elizabeth his wife

MIJAMIN BYERS, (MU311), b. Apr. 27, 1799, S.C., d. about Aug., 1864, on the Plains while on a journey from Missouri to Montana with several children and grandchildren. Served in the Black Hawk War, 1832.

SAMUEL H. M. BYERS, (MV191), b. July 23, 1838, Lawrence Co., Pa. Settled in Mahaska Co., Iowa., in 1853. Studied law, admitted to bar, 1861. Enlisted in 5th Reg. Iowa Inf., 1861. Appointed quarter-master sergeant; promoted to adjutant of reg. Prisoner 16 months, from Nov. 25, 1863, when captured at battle of Mission Ridge, until escape, Feb. 16, 1865. Served on staff of Gen. Sherman. In 1869 he was appointed United States Consul to Zurich, Switzerland.

This column, appearing in each of our newsletters, provides interesting items on recent events in the lives of Boyer family members. Contributions for future issues are welcome. Family ID numbers, where known, are from our genealogy.

David and Linda Boyer (AY136) operate The Growing Center, a non-profit organization which offers horticulture therapy, treating those who suffer from physical, mental and emotional disabilities by allowing them to work with plants inside The Growing Center's seven handicapped-accessible greenhouses, located on Hoffmansville Road in the Frederick section of Montgomery Co., Pa. David's recovery from a brain tumor in 1992 provided the basis for this program.

Robert Boyer (CB462) is back at work at Boyer's Cafe in Rexmont, Lebanon Co., Pa., after he collapsed with a failed heart last November and was saved by the use of an automated external defibrillator.

Boyer's Market on Pricetown Road in Rockland Twp., Berks Co., Pa., is now co-owned by Jerry Keller, who has worked at the store for the better part of his life. The store was founded in 1928 by **Forrest Boyer** (AZ237) and was later run by his son Elwood Boyer, whose widow still has half ownership of the store. The old-fashioned market carries "a little bit of everything."

The exhibition area of The Hill School Center for the Arts, Pottstown, Pa., was recently named the Boyer Gallery in honor of the late **James K. Boyer** (AD264), Hill Class of 1943, and his widow, **Nancy L. Boyer** of Boyertown, a noted artist.

Nancy L. Boyer (BX5C2) of Trevorton, Pa., is the Community Coordinator, COALition for a Coal Miners Commemorative Stamp. Information and an online petition can be found at www.coalminerstamp.com.

Richard Baier (Z0337) accepted the job as Director of Nebraska's Department of Economic Development and moved his family from North Platte to Lincoln, Neb.

Jamie Boyer (AI621) of Cressona, Pa., a member of the Pottsville Gymnastic Training Center, was named the state champion on floor in the Novice Optional division at the state finals held in 2003 at Exton, Pa.

The **Ellie Byers** Scholarship Fund was announced in 2003 by The Community Foundation of Frederick County in Maryland. Ms. Byers (Z0033), who died in Aug., 2002, served as the advertising and marketing director of The Wings of Freedom Air Show for seven years.

Production at the Boyer Candy Co., Altoona, Pa., maker of the Mallo Cup, resumed in the summer of 2003 after a dispute over control of the company. The company was founded in the early 1930's by **William E. and Robert J. Boyer** (BG221), and was sold in 1969 to American Maize Products, a corn syrup manufacturer, which sold the company in 1984 to the Forgione family.

Bequests

Although this has been mentioned in the newsletter in the past, it is being brought to your attention again. The directors are always looking for alternative funding methods to help facilitate the projects done by the Association. Many times innovative ideas are not brought to light because of limited funds. Therefore we are mentioning this to ask members to keep the Association in mind when planning in the future.

Cash, securities, etc. may be gifted to the Association through a specific bequest in either your will or a living trust. Such gifts may be designated for a special purpose such as providing funding for genealogical research, publication of books, or scholarships. Your will or living trust may earmark a fund in memory of a loved one or perhaps in remembrance of an ancestor in your family line.

A good alternative to a specific bequest is to specify a percentage of your estate for the Association. Still another is to direct that the residue of your estate pass to the Association after all specific bequests to family and friends have been satisfied. In addition, a bequest may be contingent upon the eventuality that some legatees may not survive you. Keep in mind that these are only suggestions and that the Association is in no way forcing these options on anyone, but is only looking at other means to assist the Association in surviving financially.
